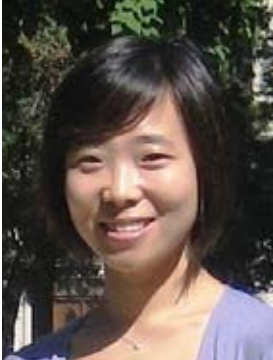


We have a busy schedule of events lined up for this spring. Previous to the inauguration of Rahm Emanuel as Mayor in May, GCI is co-sponsoring an all-day Aldermen Seminar on April 28 at the Union League Club of Chicago. Professor Yue Zhang will present the final GCI Faculty Scholar Seminar of the year on April 12 at 2pm with her talk “Governing Art Districts: State Control and Cultural Production in Contemporary China.” If you are not able to make it in person, you can download the podcast from our website afterward. Our most important event this spring is a lecture on May 13 to honor David C. Perry’s 11-year service as the Director of the Great Cities Institute. To mark David’s tenure as GCI’s director, Wim Wiewel, currently the President of Portland State University, will give a lecture on “Economic Growth and Social Equity: Dilemmas for the Urban University.” As previous Dean of CUPPA and College of Business Administration, Wim has collaborated with David on several publications. It is timely to note that David’s commitment to multidisciplinary research and engaged scholarship is apparent in everything the Institute does. Over the years David put his words into action through his own scholarly work, having published widely and given numerous presentations on the role of universities in community and economic development. He has gained international recognition for this work. Currently David is serving as UIC’s Associate Vice Chancellor for the Great Cities Commitment; in this way he continues as an ambassador for GCI and the university’s urban mission. (cont...)

“Governing Art Districts: State Control and Cultural Production in Contemporary China”

**Public Lecture:
April 12, 2011 @ 2pm**

Contemporary artists have long been marginalized in China as their ideas and lifestyles conflict with the mainstream political ideology. In Beijing, artists often live on the fringe of society in ‘artist villages,’ where they almost always face the threat of being displaced due to political decisions or urban renewal. However, in the past decade, the Beijing municipal government has begun to foster the growth of contemporary Chinese arts and designated underground artist villages as art districts. Prof. Zhang will discuss why the Chinese government’s attitude toward the art community has profoundly changed and how the changes in state governance have influenced the art community and shaped the trajectory of urban transformation in contemporary China.

Professor Zhang’s research focuses on urban politics, comparative politics, Chinese politics, and cultural policy.

This campus-wide event will be held on May 13 in the 5th floor Great Space of CUPPAH; please mark your calendars.

African American Girls and Sex

Barbara L. Dancy, Kathleen S. Crittenden, & Hongyan Ning

Because African American girls continue to be at increased risk for sexually transmitted illnesses, HCC researchers followed over a 20 month period 396 African American girls who reported at the beginning of the study that they had never had sex. These girls were between 11 and 14 years of age. The goal of the study was to find out how many of these girls within a 20 month period would continue to not have sex.

They found:

1. For all the 396 girls, 71.5%

2. Girls, who thought their mothers knew what they were doing and where they were, tended not to have had sex within the 20 month period.

And much more...

Conclusion:

Programs designed to help girls delay having sex until they are older should provide mothers information on the importance of providing maximum supervision for their daughters.
