City of Chicago Budget Engagement Report

2026







SUMMARY

This report, based on citywide community engagement, will inform the development of Chicago's 2026 budget. It reflects the complex reality facing City officials as they work to balance essential public services, community needs, and commitments to equity and progress amid financial and political strain. Since 2024, shifting federal policies and changing fiscal support have created headwinds for local governments nationwide. These pressures have required the City to navigate new constraints while maintaining its commitment to equity and transparency throughout the budgeting process.

The 2026 engagement process was built on the foundation established in 2025, but expanded in scope and depth. New and updated elements included a Budget 101 educational session with advisory councils, a stakeholder co-creation group that helped design the public roundtables, and a survey that asked residents to weigh in on approaches to property taxes and potential revenue sources. This design provided residents with more opportunities to learn and deliberate, while grounding discussions in the realities of revenues, expenditures, and structural constraints.

University of Illinois Chicago's Neighborhoods
Initiative at the Great Cities Institute (UICNI)
designed and implemented the research process,
guided by principles of transparency, documenting
community priorities, and analyzing both qualitative
and quantitative feedback. Data sources included
tabletop notes from roundtables, comment
cards (paper and online), and surveys (online and

paper) available in English and Spanish. In total, participants submitted 632 comment cards, 406 paper surveys, 599 online surveys, and 525 online comment cards, providing a robust mix of perspectives.

More than 1,200 Chicago residents engaged through surveys, roundtables, and youth-specific activities. Roundtables drew hundreds of participants to Truman, Kennedy King, and Malcolm X City Colleges, where attendees participated in small-group discussions and resource fairs. 97% of participants were Chicago residents. Demographically, the general public survey included 23% Black, 15% Latino, and 50% White respondents, while the youth survey reached 40% Black and 45% Latino participants.

Engagement results revealed both areas of consensus and differences across groups. In public health, nearly half of both adults and youth prioritized crisis response teams (48% and 51%), signaling strong support for non-police responses to mental health crises. Adults emphasized maintaining mental health clinics (24%), while youth leaned toward prevention and wellness (23%).

On youth and children's services, adults prioritized out-of-school programming (36%) and childcare (25%), while youth emphasized employment opportunities (38%) and accessible activities (34%). For community safety, public respondents placed their highest support on violence prevention (33%), while youth prioritized justice system

alternatives (26%) and support for victims and survivors (22%). In economic development, 64% of adults and 63% of youth prioritized investments in historically disinvested neighborhoods.

On environmental justice and infrastructure, adults leaned toward air pollution reduction and water system repairs, while youth favored renewable energy and clean infrastructure. For neighborhood development, adults prioritized vacant lot cleanup and reuse (42%), while youth placed greater emphasis on accessibility, digital inclusion, and simplified processes.

Residents had mixed views on how to balance City service levels with property taxes; the largest share favored raising taxes to expand services. When asked about new or expanded revenue sources, respondents expressed stronger support for options that place responsibility on corporations, institutions, or property owners rather than on individual households.

An appendix provides the full record of qualitative comments.

Together these findings illustrate a process that engaged over 1,200 residents, surfaced clear community priorities, and revealed gaps in participation for future processes to improve. Strong engagement in certain neighborhoods demonstrates progress, while underrepresentation in the Far South and Northwest Sides may highlight the need for additional or more targeted outreach. The combination of surveys, roundtables, youth engagement, and open comment underscores the City's commitment to transparency, equity, and shared responsibility in shaping the 2026 budget.

Since 2024, shifting federal policies and changing fiscal support have created headwinds for local governments nationwide. These pressures have required the City to navigate new constraints while maintaining its commitment to equity and transparency throughout the budgeting process.

In partnership with the University of Illinois Chicago's Neighborhoods Initiative (UICNI) at Great Cities Institute, this year's engagement process was designed to reach a wide range of Chicago residents. UICNI, the Office of Budget and Management (OBM), and the Mayor's Office of Community Engagement (MOCE) used participatory, equity-focused, and transparent approaches to gather insights on priorities including affordable housing, community safety, environmental justice and infrastructure, neighborhood and community development, arts and culture, public health, and youth services.

The 2026 engagement process built on the foundation established in 2025 but expanded in scope and depth. New elements included a Budget 101 educational session with advisory councils and a stakeholder co-creation group that helped design public roundtables. This approach provided residents with opportunities to share priorities and to gain deeper exposure to the budget's structural constraints, trade-offs, and revenue realities. The roundtables themselves were redesigned for more meaningful discussion, further strengthening the connection between community voices and decision-makers.

By involving residents throughout the year and across multiple formats, the City gains knowledge that shapes not only the current budget but also informs future programs and measures of progress. The engagement is designed to foster transparency and trust by actively involving a range of advisory and engagement groups across Chicago's neighborhoods. The

ongoing exchange builds shared responsibility and collaboration, ensuring budget decisions are guided by the City's commitment to equity while using community insights to enhance the effectiveness of public programs over time.

These conversations take place against a backdrop of significant fiscal constraints. In his 2025 budget address, Mayor Brandon Johnson described one of the largest budget gaps in recent history, driven by legacy pension obligations, debt costs, and limits on local revenue authority. Despite these challenges, the City has maintained its commitment to listening to residents and integrating community priorities into decision-making.

This final report presents a comprehensive picture of community priorities across all of the 2026 budget engagement process. It reinforces the City's commitment to making informed, balanced decisions that reflect both immediate constraints and long-term priorities for Chicago's communities.



ENGAGEMENT **DESIGN**

The 2026 budget engagement process was designed to provide Chicago residents with deeper opportunities to learn, deliberate, and shape budget priorities while ensuring transparency and equity in decision-making. Guided by the Office of Budget and Management (OBM), the Mayor's Office of Community Engagement (MOCE), and UICNI at Great Cities Institute, the design emphasized multiple points of entry, educational tools, and collaborative decision-making.

The 2026 budget engagement process unfolded in two phases: first, co-designing the engagement with a stakeholder group; and second, hosting public roundtables at three City Colleges, timed to align with the Mayor's fall budget address.

Phase one convened a stakeholder group to codesign the engagement. Education and capacitybuilding sessions introduced the City budget's structure and led into deliberative discussions. The stakeholder group then co-designed the process—selecting program areas and shaping the roundtable format.

The final phase brought residents across
Chicago to participate in discussions with City
department leaders and surveys that identified
their priorities for City services and revenue. This
phased approach ensured that engagement was
transparent, participatory, and informed by both
expert guidance and community insight.

Across the process, UICNI shared interim findings with OBM, MOCE, the Office of Equity and Racial Justice, and City department leaders. Educational materials, stakeholder decisions, and

departmental program lists were made publicly available to ensure clarity about how engagement was structured and how input would be used.

PHASE 1: MARCH–JUNE 2025 BUDGET EDUCATION & STAKEHOLDER COCREATION

Engagement began with a Budget 101 session for the stakeholder group which invited residents from advisory councils, commissions, task forces, and other community partners. The session introduced participants to the City budget's structure, trade-offs between revenues and expenditures, and the constraints resulting from federal and state policy. A new Budget 101 video and facilitation guide provided accessible tools for participants to use independently.

Beginning in early spring, a 15-member stakeholder group met regularly to co-design the roundtables. Stakeholders selected which programs would be highlighted in public materials through structured meetings and review of department-submitted program and service lists.

Stakeholders also decided key elements of the roundtable format, including number of discussion rounds, time allocation, table setup, and whether conversations would be open or focused. This participatory design emphasized depth over breadth, ensuring that roundtables would center on concrete examples of City programs.

PHASE 2: JUNE–JULY 2025 PUBLIC ROUNDTABLES

Engagement culminated in a series of public roundtables at three City Colleges (with accessibility and language accommodations offered):

TRUMAN COLLEGE / NORTH SIDE

MALCOLM X COLLEGE / WEST SIDE

Each 3.5-hour event opened with a brief presentation, as well as printed handouts. City department leaders and staff hosted each table, providing topical expertise and engaging directly with residents. Events featured three 25–30 minute rounds of small-group discussion; residents could "choose their own adventure," moving between topics or staying with one for the full event. Events also featured resource fairs, with representatives from 211/311 and other City departments available for assistance.

Conversations were organized around five program areas:

 Affordable Housing and Services for People Experiencing Homelessness

- Community Safety
- · Environmental Justice and Infrastructure
- Neighborhood and Community Development and Arts & Culture
- Public Health and Mental Health

In each area, three to four programs were presented, using short program sheets with descriptions, accomplishments, and equity impacts.

City department leaders guided conversations using prompts such as: How well do these programs meet community needs? What improvements are needed? What is the most important investment the City can make? and What needs are we missing?

Participants were invited to share any comments and ideas. In one example, several animal care advocates organized to attend every roundtable to share their concerns for the Chicago Animal Care and Control (CACC). As part of ensuring an open dialogue space, a separate table with department leaders from CACC was set up at every event to engage with advocates.

Participants could also contribute feedback through written comment cards, online comments, or video submissions, ensuring all voices were captured. Roundtables were grounded in the City's Guiding Frameworks—participatory, equity-centered, educational, and transparent—to ensure inclusive participation.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT ROUNDTABLE

In addition to the three public roundtables, the City hosted a dedicated youth roundtable on July 9, 2025 at the Harold Washington Library's Winter Garden, 192 youth participated. This event was designed to ensure that young people had a meaningful voice in the budget process. Participants engaged with the same program areas presented at the citywide events, but with a design tailored to youth perspectives and experiences. A youth survey accompanied the discussions, providing a structured way to record input alongside the conversation.

BUDGET ENGAGEMENT SURVEY

Alongside the roundtables, UICNI administered a Budget Engagement Survey to ensure that input could be captured consistently and compared across events. The survey was available both online and in paper form, with paper copies distributed at each of the three City College roundtables. It included demographic questions to help assess who participated, as well as structured items on fiscal choices and program priorities. Key questions asked residents to weigh approaches to balancing services with property taxes, identify which new or expanded revenue sources they would support, and select the most important programs in each service area. Openended prompts also invited participants to share additional needs in their neighborhoods and ideas for improving the engagement process itself.

The survey was designed to complement the qualitative richness of roundtable conversations with a standardized set of responses, creating a dataset that could be compared year to year and used to identify consistent themes across Chicago's diverse communities.





DATA COLLECTED

UICNI designed and carried out the research for the 2026 budget engagement process, using surveys, comment cards, and notes from roundtables and discussions. Both online and in-person participants shared feedback—through hundreds of surveys and comments—providing a mix of qualitative and quantitative data. While not representative of the entire City, these voices offer valuable insight into residents' priorities and perspectives to help inform the 2026 budget.

UICNI was responsible for the research design of the budget engagement process. Research and analysis were guided by these ideas:

- Documenting the engagement process for the 2026 budget to improve transparency.
- Determining how participants describe the progress they want to see.
- Providing the City with analysis of engagement data to provide useful results for informing the 2026 Budget.

Data collection took place throughout engagement using a qualitative and quantitative mixed-methods approach. During engagement activities, UICNI collected the following data for analysis:

- Tabletop notes from roundtables and discussions
- Comment cards (including online, for providing general comments, ideas, and feedback)
- Online and paper surveys

The online survey was published in English and Spanish on the City of Chicago's budget microsite, and links were sent via e-mail and social media. The online survey was available from June 26 through July 14, 2025, and online public comment was available from June 5 through July 14, 2025. Participation was voluntary, and all responses were collected anonymously.

Individuals at the in-person budget events turned in 632 comment cards and 406 participants completed paper surveys; 599 participants

completed the online survey and 525 submitted a comment card online. There was an overall in-person response rate of 61% for the paper surveys collected at engagement events. All data were then cleaned, coded, and analyzed. Several public and online comments cards repeated ideas and contained multiple ideas. As part of transparency and the inductive coding process, all comments were included. The comment count tallies included in the sections below are idea mentions—not unique participants or comments. The following sections include UICNI's findings and insights from the engagement process.

LIMITATIONS

It is important to recognize the limitations of these findings, including time constraints, a modest sample size, and the use of opportunity sampling rather than randomized sampling (i.e., the findings are not generalizable to the entire City population). In addition, attendees at public forums and respondents to the online survey have varying degrees of familiarity with the City's budget and budgeting process, as well as existing City programs, services, and initiatives, which may affect the feedback they provide.

As always, public forums and surveys allow residents to come to the table to be heard. Despite any limitations, UICNI's findings and insights represent the opinions and perceptions of some Chicago residents and can help inform decision-making for the 2026 budget and beyond.





PEOPLE **ENGAGED**

The 2026 budget engagement process reached more than 1,200 Chicago residents through a combination of public roundtables, youth engagement, and citywide surveys. Engagement opportunities were designed to balance broad access with deeper opportunities for deliberation, and to ensure feedback was captured in both quantitative and qualitative ways.

This section presents data analysis on people who engaged.

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SURVEY PARTICIPATION

A total of 1,005 surveys were completed: 406 on paper at the public roundtables and 599 online, including 814 general public responses and 191 youth surveys. The survey sample represents those who chose to participate in engagement opportunities and is not a statistically representative sample of all Chicago residents. Still, it provides valuable insights into the priorities and perspectives of a wide cross-section of participants.

ROUNDTABLE ATTENDANCE

A total of 467 people attended three roundtables: 154 at Truman College (June 28, 2025), 168 at Malcolm X College (June 30, 2025), and 145 at Kennedy-King College (July 1, 2025). Paper surveys were collected from 109 participants at Truman College, 54 at Malcolm X College, and 91 at Kennedy-King College.

A youth-specific event at the Winter Garden on July 9, 2025, drew 192 participants and 191 youth surveys submitted overall. In addition to completing surveys, roundtable participants engaged in small-group discussions and visited resource fair tables staffed by City departments

and service partners, meaning the reach of these events extended beyond the survey totals reported here.

RESIDENCY

The large majority of participants (97%) were Chicago residents. A small share came from surrounding suburbs but attended roundtables or completed the survey online.

NEIGHBORHOOD & ZIP CODE

NEIGHBORHOOD

Participants were asked on the survey to identify their neighborhood, but what counts as a "neighborhood" varies widely. Adult participants at public roundtables (designated as "Adult" on the maps) provided 767 neighborhood responses, while youth participants provided 166. The following "Neighborhood" maps depict the responses mapped onto the City of Chicago's 2012 Neighborhood Boundary map. Although it is not an official neighborhood map, many of the neighborhoods listed align with how residents describe their locations.

Responses were distributed across the city, with clear clusters. Adult participation was highest along the North Lakefront and North Central Corridor including Lakeview, Uptown, North Center, Rogers Park, Albany Park, and Logan Square —with notable participation on the West Side (Austin) and South Side (Hyde Park, Englewood, Auburn Gresham, and Roseland). Youth participation clustered on the West and South Sides especially in Austin, Fuller Park, Humboldt Park, Logan Square, North Lawndale, Douglas, Belmont Cragin, and Garfield Park.

Participation was uneven across geographies. Large sections of the Far South Side and parts of the Northwest Side were underrepresented, suggesting opportunities for more targeted outreach.


ZIP CODE

Participants also reported their zip code (778 adult responses; 177 youth) on the survey. The following "Zip Code" maps depict the responses mapped onto the City of Chicago's zip code map. Adult responses concentrated in Far North and North-central zip codes—60640, 60647, 60625, 60657—forming a North/Near North to Near Northwest corridor, with additional representation on the South Side. Gaps persist on the West Side, the Far Northwest Side, and the Southeast Side. Youth responses were highest in 60609, 60644, 60624, and 60647. North Lakefront and Near North zip codes had limited youth participation, and the South Side had even more limited overall participation.

Taken together with the neighborhood data, these patterns highlight where engagement was strongest and where additional outreach could help achieve more balanced geographic representation.



MAP 1. ADULT PARTICIPATION BY NEIGHBORHOOD



MAP 2. YOUTH PARTICIPATION BY NEIGHBORHOOD




ZIP CODEMAP 3. ADULT PARTICIPATION BY ZIP CODE


RACE AND ETHNICITY

Engagement reached a diverse mix of participants. Among the general public survey respondents, 23% identified as Black or African American, 15% as Latino or Hispanic, and 50% as White. By comparison, the City's population is approximately 28% Black, 33% Latino, and 29% White. Youth engagement reflected a different profile: 40% of youth respondents identified as Black and 45% as Latino, with 4% identifying as White.

These patterns suggest that while the public survey overrepresented White respondents and underrepresented Latino residents, the youth roundtable and survey were more successful in

reaching young people of color. Together, the datasets highlight both the strengths and the ongoing challenges of ensuring that engagement reflects the diversity of Chicago's communities.

AGE


The age data illustrates the breakdown of participants in the 2026 budget engagement process, reflecting separate youth and general public events. In the youth-specific engagement, participants were primarily under 17 (51%), underscoring the City's success in capturing the perspectives of high school—aged residents. Fewer responses came from older youth and young adults, suggesting that continued efforts are needed to ensure the 18–24 age group remains connected to the budget process.

In contrast, the general public engagement attracted a wide distribution across adults from ages 25 to 65+. Nearly one-third (30%) were

young adults aged 25–34, while 20% were 35–44, 28% were 45–64, and 18% were 65 or older.

This pattern suggests that the engagement process successfully included perspectives from across the life course, with a notable presence of both younger residents entering the workforce and older residents with long-term perspectives on City services. The inclusion of these diverse age cohorts helps ensure that budget priorities reflect the needs and experiences of residents at different life stages.

FIG. 2. AGE OF RESPONDENTS





INCOME

The income distribution of survey respondents leans toward moderate- to higher-income households. Among public survey respondents, 45% reported annual household incomes of \$100,000 or more, and another 34% reported incomes between \$50,000 and \$99,999. In contrast, only 9% reported incomes under \$25,000, and 12% fell between \$25,000 and \$49,999. Compared to citywide demographics, this profile reflects an under-representation of very low-income residents and an over-representation of middle- and higher-income households.

This imbalance is a common challenge in civic engagement, where residents with fewer resources often face barriers to participation. At the same time, the presence of households across a range of income levels indicates that the process did succeed in engaging both working- and middle-class residents alongside higher-income participants. Continued attention to outreach and accessibility will be essential to ensure that the priorities of lower-income households—who are often most directly affected by City services and budget decisions—are fully reflected in future engagement processes.







MILITARY SERVICE

The survey included a question on military service, asking whether respondents or members of their households had served. Overall, 10% of public survey respondents reported that someone in their household had military experience. While this is a relatively small share of the sample, it indicates that the engagement process captured perspectives from households connected to the armed forces. Including this question added another lens on the diversity of experiences represented in the budget engagement process.

Although not a central focus of the engagement, this data point underscores that Chicago residents who have served—or live with family members who have served—are part of the civic conversation about City services and budget priorities.


GENDER AND IDENTITY

Survey respondents identified across a range of gender categories, with a majority identifying as Woman or Cis Woman (60%) and another 35% identifying as Man or Cis Man. A smaller share (5%) identified with another gender identity, including non-binary and transgender categories. Youth responses followed a similar pattern, though with slightly higher representation of non-binary and other gender identities.


The inclusion of multiple gender categories provided an opportunity to reflect the diversity of participants more accurately than a binary measure alone. While women formed the majority of respondents overall, the presence of

participants across the gender spectrum indicates that the engagement process succeeded in capturing perspectives from a wide range of identities.

ENGAGEMENT **RESULTS**

This section includes analysis from all data sources and presents overarching findings and detailed topic results for all engagement activities: public roundtables, online, and the youth roundtable.

BALANCING SERVICES AND PROPERTY TAXES

OVERALL

Participants were split on how best to balance City services with property taxes, though a plurality leaned toward expansion. Nearly half (47%) supported raising taxes enough to improve and grow services, while 26% favored modest increases just to maintain current levels. Another 27% opposed any increase, even if it meant service cuts.

Paper survey respondents at roundtables were more supportive of service growth (60%) and less supportive of holding or cutting services (20% each). Online respondents were more cautious, with only 41% favoring expansion and 30%

preferring no increase. These differences may reflect how in-person participants—who engaged in longer discussions—were more inclined to see value in service growth, while online participants may have been more wary of higher costs. Taken together, the results suggest no overwhelming consensus but a clear lean toward continued or expanded investment, with stronger support for growth in roundtable settings.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Across all engagement, 108 comments addressed revenue and spending. Many called for progressive taxation, meaning higher-income households and corporations should shoulder more of the burden. Suggestions included making property taxes more progressive, taxing

corporations, or raising fees on high-value assets. At the same time, some participants rejected any tax increases, underscoring the lack of uniformity.


On spending, comments often highlighted fiscal accountability and oversight. Participants called for reducing duplication, trimming unnecessary programs, and managing staffing costs more tightly. Several also urged clearer reporting on program budgets and performance outcomes. These themes may indicate that while residents are open to raising revenue, they also want stronger guarantees that dollars are spent efficiently and equitably.

SUPPORT FOR NEW OR EXPANDED FEES OVERALL

When asked about new or expanded revenue sources, respondents expressed stronger support for options that place responsibility on corporations, institutions, or property owners rather than on individual households.

The most favored options were taxing Internet Gambling (ranked #1 overall), reintroducing a Corporate Head Tax (ranked #2 overall and #1 among paper respondents), and increasing the Vacant Buildings Fee (#3 overall). Contributions from universities with large endowments ranked

fourth overall, but slightly higher among online participants.

By contrast, household-directed fees drew far less support. Increasing garbage fees, expanding rideshare surcharges, and raising property taxes were consistently ranked lowest (positions #5–7 across all formats). The consistency across survey modes indicates a strong preference for revenue sources that emphasize institutional or nonresidential responsibility, with little appetite for options that would increase household costs.



RESULTS

AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND SERVICES FOR PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

OVERALL

Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.

Public survey respondents most often selected programs that prevent homelessness and support long-term stability (36%) and programs that connect people in crisis to shelters and related services (30%). This pattern may suggest that many residents view homelessness both as a challenge to be averted and as an immediate need requiring intervention.

Smaller shares highlighted homeownership support (18%) or renter assistance (16%), with the


low emphasis on renter programs standing out given the size of Chicago's renter population.

Youth responses showed a different emphasis. The largest share (41%) selected homeownership support, while smaller portions chose prevention (23%) or crisis services (22%).

Renter-focused programs again drew the lowest share (14%). This may indicate that youth participants were more likely to associate stability with the prospect of homeownership, while adults placed greater weight on preventing or responding to homelessness.

Overall, the results point to housing as a central concern across groups, while also highlighting different entry points: Adults leaned toward

prevention and crisis response, and youth leaned toward ownership and long-term stability.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all events and online provided a total of 147 comments related to affordable housing and services for people experiencing homelessness (see the Appendix for individual comments). Several public and online comments cards repeated ideas and contained multiple ideas; therefore, the count tallies idea mentions—not unique participants or comments.

Within this area, many comments called for expanding the supply of affordable housing across underserved neighborhoods. Suggestions included a wider range of housing types and more supportive housing for people with disabilities and older adults. Participants also emphasized the need to improve access to housing and services for people experiencing homelessness, with recommendations to expand shelter capacity and strengthen connections to care.

Stabilizing renters was another common theme. Participants suggested expanding affordable rental options, strengthening tenant protections, creating or improving a rental registry, and bolstering eviction-prevention programs. Comments also highlighted homeowner repair and preservation supports—especially for seniors and people with disabilities—and urged the City to simplify application processes and improve how residents learn about available programs.

Additional feedback raised anti-displacement

strategies, such as community land trusts, and some participants noted the importance of petfriendly housing policies.

Taken together, the comments reflect a broad interest in increasing affordable housing options, pairing housing with supportive services for people experiencing homelessness, and putting stronger measures in place to stabilize renters. Some suggestions—including rent control—would require action at the state level.



RESULTS

ARTS AND CULTURE

OVERALL


Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.

Among public survey respondents, the strongest support went to arts and cultural neighborhood programming (45%), ahead of other options. Cultural grants for organizations and individual artists were the second choice (35%), while the public art program drew comparatively limited support (20%). This pattern may suggest that many residents associate the value of City funding with direct, community-level investment rather than citywide art installations.

Youth participants showed a similar distribution, with their top choice also being neighborhood programming (43%), followed by grants (35%) and then public art (22%). That alignment across groups may indicate broad consensus that resources should flow first to neighborhood-based programming and artist support.

Taken together, the results may highlight a preference for investments that bring cultural activity into local communities and provide tangible benefits for artists and residents. Both youth and adults placed less emphasis on high-visibility showcase projects, which could signal a desire for City support that feels equitable, accessible, and rooted in neighborhoods.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all events and online shared a total of 15 comments related to arts and culture (see the Appendix for individual comments).

Many comments highlighted the importance of expanding neighborhood arts and cultural programming—bringing activities closer to where people live—and included ideas like artist residencies and youth public art opportunities. Participants also emphasized the need for dedicated funding and cultural spaces. Suggestions included increasing the size and availability of cultural grants, creating neighborhood museums that reflect local histories, and adding gallery spaces.

Some comments raised transparency and accountability concerns, with requests for clearer reporting on how arts funding is allocated and how grants are distributed. A few also called for inclusive workforce development in the arts, with specific attention to opportunities for people with disabilities.

Taken together, the comments reflect strong interest in expanding neighborhood access to the arts, strengthening grantmaking and cultural spaces, and improving transparency in City support for arts and culture.



RESULTS

COMMUNITY SAFETY

OVERALL

Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.


Among public survey respondents, the most frequent choice was violence prevention programs and services, including community violence intervention (33%).

Other priorities were more evenly distributed: mental health and victim support services (21%), programs that guide youth away from the justice system (20%), community policing (14%), and oversight and accountability at the Chicago Department of Police (13%). This may suggest

that residents see the greatest potential impact in front-end prevention strategies, while also recognizing the role of mental health and youth support services.

Youth participants showed a somewhat different pattern. While violence prevention (21%) was still a leading choice, they placed greater emphasis on programs that guide young people away from the justice system (26%) and on police oversight and accountability (17%). Mental health support (22%) and community policing (14%) drew similar shares to the general public. These responses may signal that younger participants view safety not only through intervention, but also through reform, accountability, and alternatives to the justice system.

Taken together, the results may highlight a layered view of safety. Public respondents tended to prioritize immediate violence prevention, while youth participants emphasized upstream supports and systemic accountability. This divergence could signal a generational difference in how safety is defined and where investment is seen as most effective.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all events and online provided a total of 221 comments related to Community Safety (see the Appendix for individual comments). Several repeated ideas were noted across comments, and some comments contained multiple ideas; therefore, the count tallies idea mentions—not unique participants or comments.

Within community safety, comments encompass a diverse range of ideas and suggestions for enhancing public safety. A frequent theme is reducing police funding, with many participants supporting a reduction in the police budget and reallocating funds to public health and mental health services, alternative response programs, youth programs, and additional ambulance and paramedic services. Additionally, comments commonly emphasized the need for violence prevention programs, including the youth peacekeeping initiative specifically. These comments suggest that investments in public health and non-police community safety services could be more effective in addressing public safety.

Several participants shared stories about feeling safe in their communities, crime prevention, and negative experiences with the police. Some called for an increase in police presence, a more visible police presence in communities and downtown, as well as proactive enforcement to deter crime. Others emphasized the need for trust-building, de-escalation strategies, and community policing, where officers have established relationships within the neighborhood.

Comments about police accountability were not just frequent but also underscored the necessity of transparency and oversight in law enforcement. Participants emphasized the need to implement the consent decree, strengthen the Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA), and increase transparency on the police budget, program outcomes, police discipline, and use of force. Lastly, participants suggested enhancing public safety through improvements to community infrastructure, including better lighting, activating vacant lots, and increasing responsiveness to 311 calls – all steps to creating safer neighborhoods.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

OVERALL

Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.


For both public respondents and youth, the overwhelming priority was programs that bring jobs, businesses, buildings, and infrastructure improvements to historically disinvested neighborhoods (64% and 63%, respectively). This strong majority may signal a shared belief that long-term neighborhood revitalization depends most on visible, structural investment.

Other options drew considerably less support. Among the general public, 22% selected workforce development and job training, while 14% emphasized resources and training for small businesses and entrepreneurs.

Youth participants showed a slightly different secondary emphasis: 21% highlighted small business support, while 17% prioritized job training programs. These differences may suggest that young respondents place somewhat more value on entrepreneurship opportunities, whereas the general public leans more toward workforce-focused investments.

Taken together, the results point to broad alignment across groups on the primacy of largescale neighborhood economic investment, with some variation in how smaller shares view the role

of job training or entrepreneurship. This pattern could indicate that while structural improvements are seen as the foundation, respondents also recognize the need for complementary supports that build capacity for workers and small businesses.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all engagement provided a total of 56 comments related to Economic Development (see the Appendix for individual comments).

Job creation and workforce development/
job training programs that prioritized
underserved neighborhoods were a frequent
theme. Participants' suggestions included
apprenticeship-style pathways, hyper-local job
creation through community-based organizations,
and practical, accessible programs that connect
residents to available jobs.

Participants also called for support of small business and entrepreneurial programs that advance equitable investment and business diversity, especially on the South and West sides of Chicago. Ideas included streamlining permits and licensing through a clearer, faster process; helping entrepreneurs find resources and funding, including micro-grants or seed capital; promoting neighborhood amenities and businesses more effectively; and developing co-owned/cooperative commercial real estate to build community wealth. Several comments suggested shared kitchens and incubators to reduce start-up costs, as well as utilizing pop-ups and vacant storefronts to revitalize commercial corridors.

Finally, participants emphasized the importance of developing financial and digital skills, ranging from financial literacy and wealth management to the digital tools necessary for banking, budgeting, and e-commerce. Across the feedback, commenters emphasized the need to target support to communities that have experienced disinvestment.

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE AND INFRASTRUCTURE

OVERALL


Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.

Among public respondents, the leading priorities were programs to reduce air pollution and protect health, particularly on the South and West Sides (29%), and water main line repair and replacement programs (28%). Clean energy and efficiency programs (25%) and street resurfacing (18%) drew smaller but still notable shares. This mix may suggest that residents are weighing both immediate infrastructure concerns and environmental health risks.

Youth participants showed a different emphasis. Their top choice was clean energy and efficiency programs (35%), followed by street resurfacing (28%). Air pollution reduction (25%) and water main replacement (12%) drew less support. These responses may indicate that younger participants are more focused on visible sustainability initiatives and neighborhood infrastructure, while placing less importance on water system replacement.

Taken together, the results may highlight a generational difference in priorities: public respondents leaned toward traditional infrastructure and pollution reduction, while youth placed greater weight on renewable energy and neighborhood-level improvements.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all events and online provided a total of 277 comments related to Environmental Justice (see the Appendix for individual comments). Several repeated ideas were noted across comments, and some comments contained multiple ideas; therefore, the count tallies idea mentions—not unique participants or comments.

Comments highlight the need to mitigate climate change, support environmental justice, and enhance basic infrastructure, with a focus on West and South Side communities. A frequent theme was expanding and maintaining the tree canopy to address urban heat and replace lost trees. Several raised concerns about air quality and the impact of freight and industrial activity, proposing rerouting truck traffic, installing additional air monitors near industrial corridors, and enforcing emissions more vigorously. Participants also requested an increase in the capacity and enforcement powers of the Department of Environment, as well as zoning and land-use tools to buffer homes and schools from industrial areas, and to accelerate the clean-up of contaminated sites (brownfields) to reduce exposure and promote reuse.

Participants called for flood mitigation through the expansion of green stormwater infrastructure (rain gardens, permeable alleys, and detention ponds, etc), alongside sewer upgrades and faster lead service line replacement. Some comments requested energy efficiency and building retrofits, including weatherization programs for low-income homes, solar power on public sites, and additional EV charging stations, all of which have the potential to significantly improve the City's

environmental sustainability and resilience.

Several comments emphasized the importance of safe streets and transportation, including street resurfacing, improved lighting, protected bike lanes, and a more accessible pedestrian network with ADA-compliant sidewalks, crosswalks, and traffic-calming measures. Finally, commenters highlighted the importance of clean and safe neighborhoods, including more open space, green corridors, and trail/riverwalk connections, as well as expanded access to recycling and compost, more reliable garbage pickup, rodent abatement, and stronger enforcement against illegal dumping. Collectively, comments point to an equitable, climate-resilient Chicago.



NEIGHBORHOOD AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

OVERALL

Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.

Among public respondents, the top choice was vacant lot clean-up, renewal, and sale to community members, organizations, and local developers (42%). Simplifying how residents, businesses, and nonprofits access City services (26%) and improving accessibility for people with disabilities and non-English speakers (18%) followed at lower levels, while access to free internet and computer training drew the


least emphasis (14%). This distribution may suggest that residents prioritize visible, physical improvements in their neighborhoods, while still recognizing the importance of accessibility and streamlined processes.

Youth participants, by contrast, placed greater weight on accessibility and digital inclusion. Their leading choice was programs that make it easier for people with disabilities and non-English speakers to access City services (31%), followed by simplifying City processes (29%) and internet/computer access programs (24%). Vacant lot clean-up, which was the public's top choice, drew just 15% among youth. These differences may indicate that younger participants are more

focused on inclusion and equity in services. It is also possible that youth responses reflect what they observe their parents or caregivers navigating—such as language barriers, disability access, or challenges with City processes.

Taken together, the results may highlight a generational divergence in how community development is defined. Public respondents emphasized land use and physical renewal, while youth leaned toward accessibility, equity in service delivery, and digital inclusion.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all events and online provided a total of 168 comments related to Neighborhood and Community Development (see the Appendix for individual comments). Several repeated ideas were noted across comments, and some comments contained multiple ideas; therefore, the count tallies idea mentions—not unique participants or comments.

A frequent theme (likely the result of the attendance and organizing efforts of animal care advocates) is the call for increased funding and support for Chicago Animal Care and Control. Participant comments highlight the shelter's limited budget in comparison to other major cities, emphasizing the need for expanded shelter capacity, improved facilities, additional staff, higher salaries, and dedicated leadership.

Community development practices that focus on equitable, neighborhood revitalization and preservation were a common theme. Participants called for the repurposing of vacant lots and buildings for community-serving uses, reducing

barriers to obtaining and reactivating vacant lots through programs like ChiBlockBuilder. Comments also paired these strategies with requests for affordable housing and antidisplacement measures to protect residents and small businesses, and more grocery stores to improve food access. Additionally, participants suggested streamlined City processes, including permitting, contracting, and payment processing, to enable neighborhood projects to begin and scale without delays.

Lastly, participant comments asked for improved neighborhood infrastructure, including enhanced streetscapes, comprehensive corridor planning, more open spaces and parks, and community "third spaces" that provide safe and accessible public gathering places reflecting a desire for improved public spaces that support community well-being.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND MENTAL HEALTH OVERALL

Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.

Both public respondents and youth gave their strongest support to crisis response programs that send trained behavioral health professionals (48% and 51%). This broad agreement may point to a shared sense that mental health crises require specialized, non-police responses.

Other priorities showed some divergence. Adults placed more emphasis on maintaining public mental health clinics (24% vs. 15% among


youth), while youth leaned slightly more toward prevention and wellness programs (23% vs. 21%). Substance use prevention and treatment drew the smallest share of support overall (8% and 11%).

Taken together, the results may highlight a consensus around crisis response as the top priority, with differences emerging in how secondary supports are valued—adults favoring clinic infrastructure, and youth showing more interest in preventive approaches.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all events and online provided a total of 168 comments related to public health

and mental health (see the Appendix for individual comments). Several repeated ideas were noted across comments, and some comments contained multiple ideas; therefore, the count tallies idea mentions—not unique participants or comments.

Comments highlight critical health needs through a community-centered lens, focusing on expanding mental-health services and alternative crisis responses, preventing disease, and supporting community wellness through public health funding. A prevalent theme is expanding the City's CARE program for non-police crisis intervention—including adding health teams/coresponders, extending hours of operation, and enhancing program awareness among residents. Participants reported these investments are needed to ensure residents receive appropriate care, reduce use of force, and allow officers to focus on crime prevention.

Another common theme is strong support for increasing mental health services and expanding community mental health clinics, including improving access to counseling services to reduce wait times, particularly on the South and West sides of Chicago. Calls for support for traumainformed care and survivor support services were also frequent, including ensuring continuum of care. Some also requested support for substance use treatment.

Participant comments emphasized the importance of investing in public health capacity, with requests for infectious disease preparedness and outbreak prevention, vaccinations, and increased funding for the Department of Public

Health to ensure program stability. Lastly, many called for improved access and equity through interpretation/translation services, ADA-compliant materials, and targeted outreach to underserved neighborhoods to ensure services reach those with the greatest need.

YOUTH AND CHILDREN PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

OVERALL


Within this subject area, participants were asked to select the one program they considered most important for investment.

Among public respondents, the leading choice was youth out-of-school-time programming and safe community spaces (36%). This was followed by early learning and childcare programs (25%), support services to help families connect with youth programs and activities (23%), and youth employment opportunities (17%). These results may suggest that residents view both structured activities and early learning as critical supports for young people and families.

Youth participants placed their strongest emphasis on employment opportunities (38%), followed by help accessing programs and activities (34%). Out-of-school-time programming (22%) and early learning and childcare (6%) received less support. This distribution may indicate that young people are more focused on opportunities that directly affect them—especially jobs and accessible activities—while placing less weight on early childhood services that primarily affect caregivers.

Taken together, the results may highlight a distinction between adult and youth priorities.

Adults leaned toward childcare and structured programming as supports for families, while youth



placed greater emphasis on employment and accessible activities that meet their immediate needs.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Participants across all events and online submitted a total of 107 comments related to Youth & Children's programs and services (see the Appendix for individual comments). Several repeated ideas were noted across comments, and some comments contained multiple ideas; therefore, the count tallies idea mentions—not unique participants or comments.

Participant comments emphasize the importance of investing in youth through year-round programs, including recreational activities (including sports, arts, and outdoor pursuits), after-school and mentoring initiatives, civic engagement, and youth empowerment opportunities delivered in neighborhoods where young people can easily participate.

Many participants also called for career-building pathways with direct job connections—such as paid training, internships, apprenticeships, and entrepreneurial incubators, so that youth can transition into fields like healthcare, technology/coding, and the trades. Across these ideas, commenters stressed equitable access for youth with disabilities and those in underserved neighborhoods, highlighting practical barriers such as safe transportation and the need for stipends or paid participation.

Another common theme was strong support for more affordable, high-quality early childcare, with suggestions including subsidized childcare, food for childcare centers, and investments in the childcare workforce (higher wages, workforce-learning scholarships, and bridge programs) to expand access and stability. Finally, a smaller number of comments requested youth neighborhood centers/safe spaces, as well as cash assistance for young families. Overall, the feedback reflects a desire to invest in youth and children to promote healthier and more fulfilling lives.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

In addition to the roundtable discussions, the survey asked an open-ended question about how the City could improve its engagement with residents. Across all engagement activities, participants submitted a total of 456 comments on this topic (see the Appendix for individual comments).

Many comments called for more proactive outreach and partnerships with neighborhood organizations, schools, wards, and local businesses to reach people where they are—especially groups often missed, such as youth, seniors, and residents in specific neighborhoods.

Participants also requested clearer, plainlanguage materials and visuals shared in advance of roundtables, along with an improved survey that is straightforward and easy to complete. Several suggested brief "budget basics" explanations and simple tools to illustrate where money comes from and where it goes.

Feedback on format and logistics was mixed, though common themes emerged: keeping presentations shorter and easier to follow, starting on time, and leaving ample space for discussion and Q&A. Participants requested additional language access and options to make sessions easier to attend, such as livestreams, recordings, and virtual participation. They also pointed to practical improvements like better acoustics and AV, convenient locations and times, clearer parking and wayfinding, and small supports such as refreshments that make it easier for people to participate.

Residents emphasized wanting more budget conversations on a regular basis—earlier in the budget cycle, across all wards, and with additional follow-ups so more people can take part. A recurring theme was the importance of reporting back on what was heard and what changed, to make the connection between public input and budget decisions clearer.

Alongside these suggestions for improvement, several participants shared positive feedback, noting they felt heard, found the sessions informative, and appreciated the program.



BUDGET APPENDIX A

This appendix presents the full set of public comments collected through the City's 2025 budget engagement process. In some sections, comments appear more than once. This duplication reflects a practice in which individuals or organizations circulated shared text for others to submit, with the understanding that repeating the language would strengthen its impact. To respect that intent, the database preserves duplicate comments exactly as received.

Because many comments speak to more than one theme, inductive coding allowed a single comment to appear across multiple subject areas rather than being restricted to only one. The appendix includes the text of each comment and the location where it was submitted:

- Online refers to the budget microsite or open-response survey submissions
- Names of City Colleges refer to the budget roundtables hosted at those sites

I urge the administration to think carefully about how to support the middle class across the City in a long term way - after all, our hope is that the services we provide to low income folks will allow them to climb into the middle class, so we cannot abandon them when they get there.
